From the Desk of...

Deacon José Zamora, Pastoral Leader

We are reminded today of how God transforms our lives. Isaiah promises that the LORD will transform both us and the world. The blind will see and the deaf will hear. Springs and streams will flow in barren lands. In the Gospel, Jesus cures a deaf man with a speech impediment. Jesus' touch enables the stream of God's word to flow into his ears and his proclamation of it to spring forward from his mouth. Note how physical Jesus' actions are. He sticks his finger into this stranger's ears. If that isn't enough, after spitting on his finger he puts it in the stranger's mouth. And just last week the religious authorities reprimanded him for eating with unclean hands! Jesus touches our lives in an intimate way and transforms them.

Significantly, Jesus does not tell the man he heals to *"Hear!" or "Speak!"* So important is Jesus' command that Mark leaves it in the original Aramaic: *"Ephphatha!" ("Be opened!")* Perhaps Jesus is telling him to be open and receptive to a world transformed by the Son of God. Perhaps he is calling on him to be open to faith. By repeating the word that Jesus actually spoke, Mark may want his audience—then and now—to feel like Jesus is speaking directly to them, to us.

We may not be literally deaf, but are we deaf to God's word? Do we hear Jesus tell us to carry our crosses, but do not change the way we live? Do we hear him say that those who care for the least of our brothers and sisters will join him in the kingdom of heaven, but do not take it to heart? We may not be literally mute, but do we avoid speaking our faith? What are we saying, to use an example inspired by the second reading, if we ignore or bad-mouth someone who is also a child of God? Let us open our ears and open our lips to hear and proclaim the Good News. When have I failed to be open to Jesus' message? Opening myself to his challenging message, how will I proclaim it by my words and actions?

Frequently Asked Questions about OCIA

What is OCIA?

OCIA, formally RCIA, stands for "Order of Christian Initiation for Adults." It is the process by which adults and older children are gradually introduced to Catholic beliefs and practices. It an ancient rite of the Church which was restored by Vatican II as the normal way in which adults are initiated into the Church.

How does OCIA work at St. Mary?

Here at St. Mary working with our deanery, sessions run from September through April. The group meets on Sunday afternoon from 12:30pm to 2:30pm with a lunch provided. Those who decide to complete OCIA and become Catholic will typically receive the Sacraments at the Easter Vigil Mass (the night before Easter, this year April 19th), which completes their initiation into the Church. However, depending on an individual's situation, it can take longer.

What are the steps?

The OCIA is divided into 4 periods:

- 1. Period of Inquiry/The Pre-Catechumenate.
- 2. Period of the Catechumenate
- 3. Period of Purification and Enlightenment.
- 4. Period of Mystagogy



Questions about the Catholic faith?

The Order of Christian Initiation

What does it mean to be "fully initiated" into the Catholic Church?

There are 7 Sacraments in the Catholic Church. Three of these are known as the Sacrament of Initiation. These three are 1) Baptism, 2) Eucharist (Communion), and 3) Confirmation. As a participant in OCIA, you will receive 2 or 3 of these sacraments, depending on whether you have already been validly baptized.

Is there any cost?

No. There is no cost.
