through personal prayer, meaningful liturgies, and John the Baptist emerged from the desert, as we heard last week, calling for all people to repent and be baptized, for the kingdom of God was at hand. Indeed, the kingdom of God, as enfleshed in Jesus Christ, was drawing near. The crowds have practical questions about what they should do beyond repenting and getting baptized by John. So, John gives them concrete advice. Do you have an extra cloak or extra food? Share it with those who have none. Are you working for the Roman government in order to get by? Don't steal or lie in the course of your work. In these practical ways, anyone can prepare for the coming of the Lord, the coming of the kingdom, then or now.

Interestingly, when asked by tax collectors and soldiers, thought to be collaborators with the occupying forces, John did not tell them to resign their positions and stop collecting taxes or fighting on behalf of Rome. No, he merely told them to change the way they carried out their duties. Be honest, just, and decent. In this way, we will be gathered into the kingdom, like good wheat among the chaff.

Much later, of course, Jesus will tell his disciples that when they do something for the least of their sisters and brothers, they do it for him. But the words of John the Baptist and Paul the Apostle combine to say virtually the same thing. When out of kindness we share what we have with those who are in need, the Lord is near. The Lord is as near as our neighbor in need, for he is present in those who are in need. When we see someone in obvious need of food, clothing, or shelter, do we see a failure, a freeloader, a government responsibility? Or do we see our Lord? What will help remind me to try to see the Lord in those in need?




This Winter's Bible Study Series:
